
We're also hoping for a turn-out to the first North vs. South Dock Trivia Night on 8/27.

### ... SO WHAT ABOUT A "WA360 RACE" ?

Boaters each paid \$550 to enter a race that required them to row, paddle or sail a small boat for 360 miles from Port Townsend to Olympia, WA then north to the Canadian border and back to PT. No engines, no support, and no prize money. The idea was to "circumnavigate" Washington State's inland sea. The race was a whopping 360 miles.

Pretty crazy! Well, guess what - one of our CLSC members gathered an awesome team and did just that!

What makes Jason Hanford (CLSC Member) and his team unique is their superpower - all of them are public school educators! Racing the WA360 was on Jason's Corsair F-27 Trimaran, "*Out on a Limb*" that can now be found on a mooring just off the CLSC south slips.



If Jason looks familiar (middle photo) it is because he was a *major* contributor of time and talents, working with our Junior Sailors over the course of the two sail camp weekends this past July!



# FROM SALVAGE TO SPECTACULAR ...how Jim Foy completely restored our Force 5!







*In his own words, Jim walks us through the process*: Epoxy precoat; Removed old fiberglass patch and enlarged holes until reaching clean, strong fiberglass. Made a wooden stem to have something for the new fiberglass to attach to. Use screws to pull the wood into the bed of thickened epoxy. Then fill all voids with more thickened epoxy. Screws are removed after the epoxy sets. Applied 3 coats, then gold CL numbers and a gold pin stripe.

#### FROM DIESEL TO ELECTRIC ON A CATALINA 27.

Here is the story of how Joe Pawelski made the conversion:

The Pawelski family's Catalina 27 suffered a frozen transmission bearing. The diesel engine had to be completely removed to access the damaged part. Steve Johnson helped pinpoint the problem. Chuck Crowley assisted [Joe] in hoisting the 250lb engine out with the boom onto a custom carriage to hold the engine. The hardest part was simply extracting the rear engine mount bolts requiring extreme dexterity and patience due to the confined space. Joe decided against reinstalling it. This was his opportunity to install that electric motor he had always wanted!

The electric motor, mount (a kit) and a speed controller were from Thunder Struck Motors. The mount includes a 2:1 speed reduction, matching the RPM of the old diesel. He connected the throttle control directly to the cable that use to operate the transmission, so simply move the lever forward or reverse to make the boat go. There is way more fine control of the speed than with the diesel; it also revs much faster. Power wise the boat operates similar to the diesel. The boat uses two 7 cell Nissan Leaf battery packs he bought as a kit. Together they hold 100 amp hours @ 58 volts (technically they are 48v batteries). The boat will cruise at 3.5 knots with just 20 amps of power for about 5 hours [of power]. Easily 6 knots at 100 amps and feel very confident in the heavy winds that we get out at Carter lake. 300 watts of solar will charge the batteries fully in about 2 days. This past year we took the boat up and down the lake several times a day and still had a full charge by evening. The cool part about solar on board is its always charging.

In summary: Overall we have been extremely happy with the conversion. Having auxiliary power always ready without having to worry about whether the engine will start is awesome. There are no oil changes and no coolant to worry about. No diesel smell! Being able to hear the wind and the waves and talk with ease while motoring is a game changer.

Joe is most happy to help anyone convert their boat. He is able to repair the old diesel for anyone who may be interested. There is a video of it [the old diesel] running on his YouTube channel that is noted earlier in this article.
