

How did the Club's waterfront facilities evolve from the day-sailing recorded in September 1954, to the 50-slip configuration the club enjoys today? From the archives of Club Logs and communications, a waterfront development timeline can be followed

through three stages:

1955-1976: Moorings for All

1977-1985: The Required Move to Slips

1986-1992: Into the Future

## FROM "SOUTH OF THE BORDER", THE FIRST OFFICIAL POTLUCK

GALLEY NOTESBy request, Suzy & Gary Rubin share their wonderfulGreen Chile Recipe that was thoroughly enjoyed by members at the recent potluck.

7 T butter 1/4 C + 2 T flour 1 T oil 1/2# ground beef, ground pork  $\frac{1}{2}$  lb. chuck roast in  $\frac{1}{2}$ " cubes (Suzy uses a pork roast) 3 garlic cloves, minced 1+ large onion, fine chop 1T parsley, fresh, chopped 2 tsp Tabasco 1 tsp dried oregano, crumbled 2-3 tsp cumin, ground 1/2 tsp black pepper 3+ C chicken stock or beef 12 oz Mexican beer 1 tomato, diced (*canned – lots*) 1/3 C coriander, fresh chopped cilantro (optional) 2 lbs. green chilis, seed, peel, chop. (both roasted Hatch, & mild canned green chili's

Note: Suzy also adds green peppers, chili powder, some salt, celery, approximately 2 tsp sugar or not....all to individual taste.

In heavy skillet cook 4 T butter & 1/4 C flour over moderate low heat stir for 3 min. & reserve this roux.

In large skillet heat oil (*I don't use oil as the meats have plenty of fat and juice*), add ground meats, and chunks. Cook till no longer pink, and transfer to a plate with slotted spoon (*I put it on paper towel to absorb fat*). In remaining fat + 3 T butter cook onion, garlic, add spices, and add remaining 2 T flour, and cook, stirring for 3 min. Add meat broth, beer, chili's, tomatoes. Bring to boil, stirring. Stir in the reserved roux until well mixed. Simmer for about an hour, stirring occasionally. Improves with age. Serve topped with shredded cheeses (jack, cheddar), chopped lettuce, tomatoes, and onion.

*Editor's note:* Never hesitate to ask if you enjoy a dish at a CLSC event and would like to make it yourself! We are always happy to approach the "cook" and ask if we may share their recipe with our members.

**WHERE ARE THEY NOW** *Periodically we feature news of a (former) CLSC member. I was recently in contact with Jennifer Gruver, alum of our sailing club and the Junior Sailing program. Jenn's parents, Linda and Jeff Gruver, are active members of our club. Here is Jenn's story.* 



Beginning with garage sale skates at age 6, and with her family's enthusiastic and loving support, Jenn developed her skating skills carving out an extraordinary career that emerged after her graduation from CU, Boulder with a BS in Cultural Anthropology. Jenn's talent on the ice landed her with Disney on Ice, building a new production as an ensemble and character skater. Her world travel including skating performances over five years touring the US West Coast, Mexico, Eastern Europe, Dubai, United Arab Emirates, Qatar, S.E Asia, Australia, New Zealand, Japan, Peru, and Argentina.

After "maximizing" her Disney experience, Jenn moved to New York, where her talent on the ice was quickly recognized by the Ice Theatre of New York and where she became a member of their ensemble, performing at iconic rinks including Rockefeller Center and Central Park. Jenn was cast in a production for SELF magazine, SleepNumber and Saturday Night Live as a skating double for cast members. She began her own coaching business, *Coach Jenn LLC*, and is also the *Director of Figure Skating* at the Navesink Country Club in Red Bank, NJ where she produced an ice show with over 100 young skaters.
