GENERAL REMINDERS

All boats MUST have current year Colorado registration stickers <u>or</u> USCG documentation <u>prior</u> to launching your boat. No exceptions. Please plan ahead.

Please also have a current 2023 Larimer County Park sticker in your car window at all times when on the grounds as <u>all</u> of our facilities (Clubhouse area, Camping, Parking Lots) are within Larimer County Park boundaries.

Colorado minimum boating & Safety <u>Requirements</u> are: Numbers & registration; USCG Approved Personal Flotation Devise of 1 per person and a throwable; Fire Extinguisher; Horn/Sound Signal device, Navigation Lights. <u>Recommended</u> additions: First aid kit; Anchor & Line; Flashlight; Signaling Mirror; Tool Kit/Spare Parts; Oars/Paddles and a Bailing Bucket.

Be sure to let us know if you can help in any way as we approach the summer and showcase our Junior Sailing Program!












RULES OF THE (BOATING) ROAD

Editor's note: 'found this article of somewhat basic, though important information for us all, as we navigate Carter Lake!

This article applies to sailing vessels that are in sight of one another. For sailors, these are rules we know well. Port tack gives way to starboard tack, windward gives way to leeward, and if you're on port tack and unsure of the other vessel's point of sail, you must give way.



In all the situations there are two types of vessels, the **Stand On**, and the **Give Way**. The Give Way vessel must take early and substantial action to keep clear. The Stand On vessel must maintain her course and speed until it becomes clear that the Give Way vessel isn't following the rules, and even when that happens the rules state that the Stand On vessel should avoid turning to port.

Overtaking is one of the most misunderstood rules. Quite simply, it does not matter what type of vessel you are. If you are overtaking, **you must stay clear of the other vessel**. Even if you're a sailing vessel overtaking a power-driven vessel, you must stay clear. If you are the **Overtaken** vessel, you must

maintain your course and speed -otherwise how can the other vessel stay clear?



Head On meetings between power-driven vessels require that both vessels alter course to starboard.

Crossing Situations are also often misunderstood. Simply put, the vessel that's coming from your starboard side has the right of way, and you are required to either alter course or slow down so as to pass astern of that vessel.
