Ahoy Mateys!




CELEBRATING 70 YEARS OF SAILING HISTORY

On August 19, 2023, The Carter Lake Sailing Club celebrates 70 years of continued focus on sailing recreation in the oldest sailing club of its kind in Colorado. Current and past members are invited to come to Carter Lake to share food, fun and memories.

Seventy years ago, August 20, 1953, sailing enthusiasts on Sloan's Lake, Denver, Colorado, held the first official meeting of the Denver Sailing Club. Thirteen members attended and paid dues of \$1 each. Officers were elected and by-laws were adopted.

By the end of 1953, club plans had begun to include a lake seventy miles north. Otto Koehler, founding member, had heard about a new reservoir, Carter Lake, that would be half-full by summertime. He emphasized the chance of leasing a lot from the government with the possibility of building a club house there. While Carter was a distance away, the dropping water level at Sloan's Lake made "Let's give Carter a trial!" the club slogan. As soon as the government notified members the lake was open to boating, the group launched three boats on Carter Lake for a race on Labor Day, 1954.

The rest, as they say, is history. (Find a detailed history on the sailcarter.org main page under the About tab.) The club grew over the years, but remained unique in that members were committed to remaining a working club, financing, building, maintaining, and improving the clubhouse and docks facilities as well as sponsoring races and social events. The shared vision and camaraderie of those early members laid a foundation of "All For One and One For All", building an enduring willingness to share the work and cost and ultimately the enjoyment.

CLUBHOUSE & GROUNDS *Art Umble*

As our 70th Anniversary celebration approaches, preparing the grounds around the Clubhouse has been a priority. Some of these activities are things on our annual list of maintenance items, while others are unique to this season. On August 5th, a workday was held at the Clubhouse to attack a number of these priorities, and attack we did!! Over the course of the day, ten volunteers braved the heat and worked hard at tasks that were not easy. Here's a rundown of what was completed during the workday.

A consequence of the above-normal spring and early summer rains, a significant amount of stone cover in the parking area was washed out, and the drainage swales alongside the roadway experienced significant erosion. During the workday, ten tons of crushed stone were spread onto the washed out and eroded areas to restore integrity to the grounds. A huge thanks goes out to Matt, Aaron, Jeff, and Tom for their herculean efforts with shovels, 5-gallon buckets, and a hugely useful wheelbarrow (provided by Steve Wood) to spread this material.



Keeping the grounds mowed and free of fast-growing weeds around the clubhouse is an on-going challenge. A special thanks again to Matt for bringing his mower and taking on this task during our workday. Furthermore, Matt spent significant time with a weed whacker clearing away a lot of the weeds along the walkways, parking areas and deck. Great work, Matt!

For some years now, the tool storage shed has been accumulating lots of "stuff", ranging from containers of nuts, bolts, screws, nails, etc., to tubs of ropes and lines, to half-full paint cans, to chains, to sets of wrenches, and other tools. Many of these items remain useful to the Club, while others are well beyond useful life. To this end, Andrea Mann took on the great challenge of clearing out the shed, cleaning off the shelving, preparing it for a return and reorganization of the usable materials. Great work, Andrea!!

And that's not all Andrea did during the workday. She took on the challenge of cleaning the dirty latrine stalls to a much-improved sanitary level. Thank you, Andrea, as this was greatly needed.

The need to keep our deck railings protected from the elements with paint is a never-ending, annual activity. Mark & Sandy Parkins, Jeni Umble and Brenda Wood provided the elbow grease of scraping away much of the old paint and brushing on with new. Super work, all !


In all, the workday was successful on many fronts. A heartfelt thanks to each of you for the efforts you put out during that day.

We have had a good racing season at Carter Lake this year, with both racing on Saturdays and a new addition of dingy racing on Thursday nights. The number of racers on Saturdays have been lite, with 3-5 boats participating on Saturdays. We would love to get more boats off the docks and racing.

Participation on Thursday nights have increased with 9 boats and 15 people at the last event. Thursday nights will continue at least through August as long as interest continues. It is a great way to have family time on the water. Many people have had great experiences so far this year.

For Saturday racing events without potlucks, we have been having \$3 hamburgers after racing. This has been very popular and we will continue this tradition during the fall. It is a great way to discuss racing tactics and improve your racing ability.

We had a good turnout for the Carter Lake Open Regatta on June 3 & 4 with 19 boats competing in 4 classes. Racing was only held on Saturday, with rain and lack of wind preventing racing on Sunday. Even with only one day of racing, it was still a great event for all. Thanks to everyone who volunteered to help with the regatta!

We are having a fun race for the 70th CLSC Anniversary celebration. The race will start at the docks and proceed around mark 7 and back to the docks. See the sailing instructions for the complete set of rules.

****Other Regattas around Colorado and Beyond****

The annual Aspen regatta was held on July 15 & 16 with several CLSC racers participating. The regatta is memorable as everyone camps at the yacht club with activities Friday, Saturday and Sunday evenings. They include a live band and a catered dinner on Saturday night with dancing. The regatta had 6 classes with 28 boats participating. CLSC racers finished 2nd and 3rd in the J-22 class.

Sailors from Colorado were represented at the Santana 20 Nationals in Eugene, Oregon with 3 boats participating. Eugene, with only a population of 200,000 people, has a unique yacht club that boasts 219 members with roughly 150 boats. We attend a typical Thursday evening race with over 30 boats on the water and over 100 people having hamburgers after racing. The Santana 20 Nationals is the third national event held by the club this year.

Several other Colorado clubs are holding regattas this fall including Dillon, Cherry Creek, and Chatfield.






