# From the Chair of the Regatta

Each year, the Club designates the Vice Commodore as Chair of its annual Regatta. As the Club's Vice Commodore, I automatically became the Chair of the Club's 2024 Regatta. Whether it was a blessing or a curse depends on which day of the week you talked to me.

Work on the Regatta began months before the actual event. The learning curve was steep and challenging at times. But as a racer, I look back and appreciate the efforts previous Vice Commodores did to make for successful regattas.

As with previous regattas, this year's Regatta was open to all Performance Handicap Racing Fleet, commonly referred to as "PHRF," which is pronounced as a word (perf) and not as the initials P-H-R-F. PHRF is a handicapped system that allows classes of sailboats to compete against each other as fairly as possible. (See Page 4 regarding the difference PHRF can make to a race.)

Our Club's 65th Open Regatta had 16 boats registered: 13 Club boats and three out-of-club boats. The 16 boats were divided into five fleets: Santana 20, J22, PHRF A, PHRF B and PHRF C.

The first day of racing on Saturday, June 1, had four races with varying wind. One race had gusts up to 35 knots which made for some exciting racing conditions. The wind forecast for the second day of racing was for light winds with stronger winds in the afternoon. Those stronger winds, however, never materialized. Despite very little wind during one race, two fleets were able to complete three races on Sunday while three fleets completed two races.

Thank you to all racers who participated in the Regatta, the numerous volunteers who gave their time and talent to make for a very fun and successful 65th Regatta and the Club members and out-of-town racers who supported the Regatta by purchasing dinner tickets, attending the Regatta BBQ and contributing to the success of the drawing.

# Three Boats Key to Successful Regatta

A CLSC-sponsored Regatta requires three boats that are on the water but don't compete: Race Committee boat, Finish boat and Chase boat. And each of these three boats require volunteers.

Serving as Principal Race Official on the Club-owned Race Committee boat was Tom Downing, a non-member who has served as PRO for the Club's annual Regatta for many consecutive years and knows the racing rules inside and out. Others volunteering on the Race Committee boat were John Heer and Marcia Marshall, both Club members and Duane Chaloupka, a former Club member.

For those who don't race, the Race Committee boat decides the race course, sounds the warning horn and puts flags up and down in a specific sequence and at a specific time. Timing and precision are critical. Those on the Race Committee boat also watch that no boat crosses the start line before its designated time. If a boat crosses the start line even one second early, it must go across the start line, turn around and start again.

Three Club members worked the Finish boat: Mike McCaul, Linda Kroll and Teres Lambert. These individuals watch as each boat crosses the finish line, sounding an air horn when it does and writing down the finish time. Finish time is written down in hour, minute and seconds. Since the Club owns only two boats, the Finish boat was a Catalina owned by Regatta Chair John Krueger and his wife Teres Lambert.

The third boat on the water, the Chase boat, was the Club-owned "banana boat." Club members Joanne Jarvis and Bridger Parsons worked both Saturday and Sunday on the Chase boat. Completing the team of three on Saturday was Rob Jarvis and on Sunday Maria Cabrera. The Chase boat has two key purposes: 1) to serve as a safety boat in a time of need; and 2) to move the starting line pin and the finish line pin when needed. For non-racers, the pins must be moved when wind direction changes. It is important that the start line be perpendicular to the wind.

The Club-owned "banana boat" served at the Chase boat during the Regatta. Volunteers on the Chase boat, Race Committee boat and Finish boat started Day 1 around 11 a.m. and were off their boat around 4 p.m. On Sunday, Day 2 of the Regatta, their day began around 10 a.m. and wrapped up about 2:30 p.m.





# Day 1 of Racing

The first day of racing was a day that started with a bright blue sky that turned dark grey, with winds varying from ideal to "You better know how to sail and don't mind heeling and having the rail in the water." A Santana 20 racer said the challenging conditions at one point in the day emphasized the importance of the crew communication and working as a team to stay upright.













## Day 2 of Racing

The winds on the second day of racing ranged from virtually non-existent to ideal for racing.

Race 1 started with a bit of breeze, with the wind often too weak to move boats. The "no wind" situation resulted in three fleets being timed out. PHRFs A, B and C received no scores for Race 1 as the three fleets timed out: Each fleet had only 90 minutes from the time the horn sounded at the start line to a boat crossing the finish line. Uncooperative wind resulted in none of the boats among the three fleets crossing the finish line within the 90-minute time frame.


Thankfully, the wind returned so two more races could be conducted.


